This Seminar is organised as part of the continuing Natura 2000 Biogeographical Process. Launched by the European Commission at the end of 2011, the aim is to improve and strengthen the implementation of Natura 2000 and ensure progress towards key EU 2020 Biodiversity Strategy targets. The process provides the means for Member States and expert stakeholder networks to:

- Work together and collaborate on practical habitat management issues identified as being of common priority and shared importance;
- Take stock of the current conservation status of specific priority habitats in a biogeographical region and determine what needs to be done collectively to improve, maintain or restore the condition of Natura 2000 sites:
- Share experience, build knowledge and develop consensus about priority management actions required for particular habitat types in the Mediterranean region;
- Take specific agreed cooperative actions to restore or maintain favourable conservation status for those habitats that fall within their territory;
- Network and exchange management experience information, to continue to build know-how about the most effective ways to achieve more for habitats and species of Community importance.

Introduction to the Mediterranean Kick-off Seminar

Hosted by the Ministry of Environment, Greece, and the Axios, Loudias and Aliakmonas Management Authority, the Mediterranean Kick-off Seminar provides an important opportunity for participants to ensure progress in the Region towards the EU 2020 Biodiversity Strategy targets - for example, by building common understanding about practical ways to halt biodiversity loss, to inform and increase restoration actions where necessary and prioritised, to stimulate new know-how about effective management approaches and techniques, and to improve the favourable conservation status of priority habitats and species.

This Seminar has been developed to launch a continuing process of networking, information sharing and knowledge building, of direct benefit to stakeholders across the Mediterranean biogeographical region. It is the first in a series of themed Workshops and Seminars that will be developed in the months and years ahead to improve practical management know-how in priority habitats across the Mediterranean region. Through such networking events, as well as the Natura 2000 (knowledge & information) Platform, the core aim is to achieve maximum benefits for nature and improve essential cooperation amongst all stakeholders as that is required to achieve progress towards the 2020 targets.

Over the course of this three-day Mediterranean Seminar, we will aim to:

- Identify and agree practical concrete actions and cooperation priorities, which can be developed and taken forward by various actors in the Region.
- Share information and experience, capitalising on completed projects, available guidance and potential new proposals to increase synergies and collaboration opportunities.
- Seek new commitments to develop networking in future and, where possible, propose a firm timetable for future Mediterranean events.

At the kick-off seminar there will be four Habitat Working Groups, one for each of the following habitat groups: Coastal, Forests, Freshwater/Wetlands and Grassland/Heaths/Scrubs. Seminar participants should come prepared to share their expertise, information and knowledge about the Natura 2000 habitats of which they have experience. Especially in the interactive Habitat Group sessions, participants will gain understanding about how the Natura 2000 biogeographical process can be used to contribute to EU and MS strategic priorities, as well as about practical steps to help them in their work. Participants will discuss & begin to:

- Explore how the Seminar (the possible actions and expected outcomes generated) can be linked to and be useful for national and regional priorities attached to improved management of specific habitat types.
- o Discuss and define possible follow up cooperative actions to improve practical habitat management and agree levels of priority about what can be done together.
- o Specify the scope of what can be done following the Mediterranean kick-off Seminar.

	One of the most important wetlands in Greece is located on the western shoreline of the Thermaikos Gulf. The Axios - Loudias - Aliakmonas Estuaries National Park, consists of the deltas of the Axios and Aliakmonas rivers, the estuaries of the Gallikos and Loudias rivers, the Kalohori lagoon, the Nea Agathoupoli marsh and the Alyki Kitrous lagoon. This is a large complex wetland system with a total surface area of around 320 sq. kms. Thanks to the great diversity of ecological conditions – ranging from extensive rice fields, grasslands and riparian forests to salty marshes and swamps - the area makes an ideal habitat for many species of wild animals and plants. Together, participants will be able to see how Natura 2000 is being implemented on different sites around Thessaloniki, what challenges there are and what solutions are being applied. Also, of course, delegates will be able to network informally, share their own experiences and discuss the condition of Mediterranean priority habitats, in their countries, "in the field". We are extremely grateful to the Axios Management Authority for organising the site visit and also to them and their partners for arranging our guides to inform us about their work in Natura 2000 sites.
