The LIFE programme

- The LIFE programme as a whole constitutes a 100% contribution to the objectives and targets of the European Green Deal.
- The only EU programme dedicated exclusively to the environment, nature conservation and climate action.
- It is over 30 years 'young'








The LIFE programme

- For the years 2021-2027: budget of 5.43 billion €
 - > 3.4 billion € for LIFE 2014-2020
 - Call 2023 budget: 611 million €

The multiannual work programme for 2021-2024 was adopted in July 2021.







Type of projects funded under LIFE

Grants

- Action grants:
 - Standard Action projects (SAPs)
 - Coordination and Support Actions (CSAs)
 - Strategic Nature Projects (SNaPs)
 - Strategic Integrated Projects (SIPs)
 - Preparatory projects addressing ad hoc Legislative and Policy Priorities (PLP)
 - Technical Assistance (TA-PP and TA-RR)

• Operating grants (call restricted to entities that signed a LIFE Framework Partnership Agreement)

Standard Action Projects (SAPs)

'Traditional' LIFE projects aiming to



Develop, demonstrate and promote innovative techniques, methods and approaches

Contribute to the knowledge base and to the application of best practices





Support the **development, implementation, monitoring and enforcement of the relevant Union legislation and policy**, including by improving governance at all levels, in particular through enhancing capacities of public and private actors and the involvement of civil society

Catalyse the large-scale deployment of successful technical and policy related solutions for implementing the relevant Union legislation and policy by replicating results, **integrating related objectives into other policies** and into public and private sector practices, **mobilising investment and improving access to finance.**







Standard Action Projects (SAPs)

- Co-financing rate
 - 75% for projects targeting exclusively priority habitats and/or species
 - 67% for project targeting both priority and non-priority habitats and/or species
 - 60% all other projects
 - Maximum 10-year duration



Strategic Nature Projects (SNaPs)

Focussing on the implementation of

The Prioritised
Action Frameworks
(PAFs) under the
Habitats Directive

Other plans or strategies that implement EU nature and/or biodiversity policy or legislation on international, national, regional or multiregional level

for the implementation of pledges

- Require integrated approaches and complementary funds mobilisation
- Require mainstreaming of biodiversity objectives into other policies and instruments
- Co-financing rate of 60% maximum, max. 14-year duration





Strategic Nature Projects (SNaPs)

Key issues to be considered

- The national (regional) authorities competent for nature and biodiversity and responsible for PAF implementation, shall participate in the SNaP proposals, either as applicant (coordinating beneficiary) or, in duly justified cases, as associated beneficiaries.
- To ensure the highest possible geographical coverage of SNAPs by 2027, regional authorities are strongly encouraged to team up with other regions when preparing their proposal.
- Transboundary SNaPs: A coordinated implementation of SNAPs between Member States is strongly encouraged.





Strategic Integrated Projects (SIPs)

Focussing on the implementation of



Circular Economy and Quality of Life (ENV)

- Circular Economy: national or Regional Circular Economy Action Plans, Strategies, Roadmaps or similar
- Waste: national and regional Waste Management Plans and/or Waste Prevention Programmes
- Water: River Basin Management Plans, Flood Risk Management Plans, Marine Strategies
- Air: Air quality plans pursuant to the Ambient Air Quality Directive, National Air Pollution Control Programme



- Co-financing rate of 60% maximum
- Maximum 14-year duration

Climate Change Mitigation and Adaptation (CLIMA)

- National Energy and Climate Plans;
 National Energy Efficiency Action Plans;
- National or regional adaptation strategies or action plans;
- Urban or community-based action plans pioneering the transition to a climate neutral and/or climate resilient society;
- National, regional or industry-/sectorspecific greenhouse gas mitigation strategies or economy roadmaps contributing to climate neutrality





Technical Assistance Projects (TAs)

There are two TA calls in 2023:



- Co-financing rate of maximum60%
- Maximum LIFE contribution of EUR 70,000





- Preparation for facilitating the up-scaling and replication of results from other projects funded by the LIFE Programme, its predecessor programmes or other EU funding programmes
- <u>LIFE23:</u> Call only proposals <u>in the field of 'Environment'</u> (i.e. 'Nature and Biodiversity' and 'Circular Economy and Quality of Life')
- 60% co-funding
- Call budget 6.5 M€





Lessons learned

Overall common mistakes



Relevance:

Problem analysis is too general and only partially demonstrates the need for the STRAT

Main gaps identified in the plan, e.g. the low stakeholders awareness, is insufficiently addressed

Impact:

Impacts are general, e.g., "improved adaptation capacity"

Indicators for monitoring and evaluation of project actions is limited

> Project sustainability uncertain

Quality:

Risk analysis insufficient, risks underestimated

Stakeholders missing. Their mobilisation and commitment uncertain

Project sites not defined

Resources:

Costs are not sufficiently justified and detailed

Poor reference to green project management measures

Complementary funding:

Complementary actions links to the project vague

No clear explanation on how sectors not covered by the STRAT will be addressed to fully implement the plan/strategy


